FCC Hits 25 Year Milestone

Two Major Events In August Celebrating Fernwood

Amidst the recent turmoil created by the threat of Recreation Renewal decommissioning Fernwood Community Centre, staff at the Centre are optimistic that their upcoming twenty-five year anniversary will be a turning point towards a progressive future. The Centre's gregarious Executive Director Roberta Martell recently expressed her reaction to the Fernwood neighbourhood's support.

It was heart-warming to see the outflow of appreciation for our programs and staff by Fernwood residents," Martell said. "People were stepping forward to say how much they appreciated the work we do and our dedication to bring pro-social recreation and service programs to the community."

Fernwood residents sent a multitude of e-mails and handwritten letters to the Mayor and councillors, attesting to the importance of their neighbourhood community centre.

The letters of support came from everyone," Martell explained, "from people who regularly use the free internet to Parent & Tot drop-in participants, childcare parents, seniors, and those who make use of our many free and low-cost recreation programs." As it now stands, Mayor and Council accepted the idea of redeveloping Crystal Pool, yet directed City staff to come back to them in September with a strategy to do more community consultation.

In celebration of their twenty-fifth year anniversary, staff at Fernwood Community Centre – colloquially known as "Big Fernwood" – are currently busy preparing for their anniversary bash, which will include two special events:

On Wednesday, August 18, there will be a gala evening at The Belfry Theatre, featuring the musical comedy "I Love You, You're Perfect, Now Change." The forty-dollar ticket price to this

special evening buys a seat for the show, and the main door prize is a \$3400 skin-on-frame kayak, which is being handcrafted by Martell herself.

And just when you think those are enough reasons to run to the Belfry and get your ticket, here's one more incentive: every penny raised from this event is going towards opening up the community centre's brand new Infant & Toddler Daycare, to be housed in the portable behind the Centre and scheduled for launch at the beginning of September.

The other half of this celebration is the 9th Annual Fern Fest on Saturday, August 28, a day which promises to surpass Fern Fest events of the past. The all-day festivities (from 10am to 10pm) will include live entertainment by ska band The Hoochie Girts, country-rock classic cover band Rockville, local folkies James Kasper and Cat Ratusny, a Children's Nickel Carnival, a barbecue

concession, a beer garden, The Fernwood Spa, a silent auction and raffle, a Seniors' Tea, community service groups, and CD Release Party for the "It Came From Fernwood" compilation CD.

Long-time Fernwood resident and musician Mike Demers recently spoke to the purpose of the Fernwood CD: "The intent is to foster a sense of pride for Fernwood residents," Demers said, adding that it was also to "promote awareness for other people in Greater Victoria of the wealth of talent in our community."



Martell summed it all up in her unique way, "Our door is open. Come play with us."



FCA involved in new edition

Fernwood Update

As Fernwood Community Liaison, I enjoy helping community members get answers and ensuring service to the neighbourhood. I imagine that for every question asked of me, there are probably 50 people who would also like to know the answer. So here is a list of several of the Items I have been helping community members with and some of the answers supplied by City staff. If you have a question or concern, please do not hesitate to contact me at City Hall (361-0218) or on my cell (217-9273).

The planting of traffic circles on Denman Street

"I am wondering why only one traffic circle has been landscaped (at the Shelbourne end of Denman). The others look unsightly and collect garbage. When will the remainder be landscaped? It has been at least 2 years or more (if I am correct) since those traffic circles were put in."

Many residents on the campaign trail requested that the circles be planted. The original one in Fernwood was a pilot to see how successful the planting would be and determine the costs. Thanks to Council's approval, money has been allocated to upgrade the remaining 6 islands. This will be done in 2004.

Park behind Fernwood Community Centre

"I see that there has been a new playground installed at this park, which is a welcome improvement on the very old equipment there formerly. However, the park grounds are still unattractive and look unfinished. What is the plan for this

Council has approved funding to do additional upgrades in Stevenson Park this year. Parks design staff have been working with the community to ensure that all opportunities are reviewed. Residents may talk to one of the community representatives (see plans in window of FCA office or article on page...) or call Deborah Bate at Parks at 361-0607. There will be more consultation and construction this year.

3. Alexander Park

"The playground at this park is aging and needs replacing. Some aesthetic. improvements to the park would be very welcome, as many families in the neighbourhood use this park with their toddlers. Also, it seems that in the spring and summer months, there has been a history of inadequate care of the playing field, which is generally full of weeds. Sometimes the grass is knee-high before it is cut. Are there any plans for this park?"

The playground at Alexander Park was replaced in 1996. We still have many older playgrounds and this year we will be replacing one that was installed in the 1960s. However, we will look at Alexander Park and see if there isn't something we can do to spruce it up.

Many of our parks are still not irrigated. Thankfully, Council approved funding for installing underground, fully automated imgation systems which will not only save water and money but will improve the quality of the playing surfaces by improving turf vigour which will create less of an opportunity for weed growth. We will eventually get to Alexander Park after we have installed irrigation in some of our parks like Beacon Hill that presently are being watered by hand in the daytime when evaporation is the highest.

Mowing is done on a 10-day schedule. Sometimes, at the peak growing time this is not enough; however residents are encouraged to call for more information or to report a concern. The number is 361-0600.

Fernwood Road (between Balmoral and Pandora)

"I walk this road every day with my daughter. A section of the sidewalk on the east side has two areas with very overgrown hedges, which make it impossible for two people to pass each other on the sidewalk. This is dangerous in this area which is a busy commuter intersection. Can the property owners be required to trim the hedges? Also, the edge of the sidewalk along here is disintegrating, and in several places is missing."

Letters have been written to request owners to trim their hedges. If the problems continue, then it may also involve our bylaw section but we will look after it.

Road cleaning

"Does the city clean streets? On our street, there are grass and weeds growing directly on the street because the sides of the street have never been cleaned and the homeowners do not do it. Is this a city or homeowner responsibility? If it's a homeowner responsibility, can homeowners be required to remove weeds, grass etc?"

Yes, the City cleans streets. The entire city is swept on rotation. Downtown is swept daily (we are planning twice daily in the summer). Arterial roads are done weekly, and quieter streets once every 6 weeks. Any immediate problem (like a spill or dumping) is dealt with right away in response to complaint or notification.

Street sweeping cleans up dirt, broken glass, debris, litter and the like; grass and vegetation are not so easy to get rid of. We avoid use of chemicals, and in my experience, citizen requests to dig out grass and vegetation are carried out promptly by street cleaning staff. In discussing the issue with staff it was noted that when streets have many cars parked on them the cleaner can't get to the gutter. We have considered parking restrictions but that can be difficult.

General landscaping and improvements

"I have noticed general street landscaping and improvements in areas like Harris Green, the Quadra business area, and Finlayson Street. These have really made a difference the appearance of the neighbourhoods. I would like to know why some neighbourhoods have been selected for this, and whether Fernwood will have these kinds of improvements."

The projects mentioned were a joint venture between the City and the local businesses. Much of this work was accomplished on a 50/50 cost-sharing basis. There is no reason why this couldn't be done in Fernwood. Council has recently approved a special project grant in the amount of \$5000 to the Fernwood Community Association and Centre for the beginning of the revitalization of Fernwood Square. [1]



A Sense of Place

The Crescent Moon article by Beth Gibson in the Spring issue of Fernwood News touched a string. I liked the article very much and hope to see more of them. We moved to Victoria and more precisely to Fernwood in July 2003 and somehow I felt from the very beginning that I had come home. The real estate agent was trying to discourage us, saying that this district has pockets of ups and downs. But we think that real life is where diversity coexists. And with the fresh look of newcomers we can see it. Most of the time we walk or bike to all needed destinations and this way we see the neighbourhood intimately. On one of our walks last fall we discovered quite a big, for such a central location, neglected garden with very colourful and healthy looking chickens roaming around. From then on we deliberately chose this route to see the birds. But early this February we noticed some changes in the yard: the chickens were confined to a smaller area close to the house. As the weeks passed, the yard started taking a different shape: the piles of leaves transformed into raised beds. Then some plants appeared on them. Then the interesting gate constructed from old bicycle wheels appeared.

Finally, on a sunny day in April, the mystery of transformation was revealed to me. While buying bread in the Wild Fire bakery, I noticed a young man passing bags of crisp fresh lettuce to the vendor. I also noticed a few pots of nasturtium plants he brought to plant in their window containers. I asked if I could buy some and was told that if I lived in Fernwood it would be delivered to me. And two pots of beautiful nasturtiums were delivered by bicycle a few hours later. Seeing the freshness of the salad greens I asked where they were coming from, and guess what...from the yard that used to be occupied by the chickens! Thanks to the people of Up From the Ashes City Farm, we have the privilege of regularly receiving fresh and very local salad greens, culinary herbs and vegetables. Rev, the farmer, uses organic methods of production for all the bounty from the garden. The produce not only tastes good, but also looks beautiful with greens dotted by bright edible flowers. And on numerous occasions I have seen people stopping and looking at the garden.

Another event gave us historical insight into Fernwood: In May, a revised volume of This Old House was published on Fernwood & Vic West heritage neighbourhoods, and over a number of late evenings I have been immersed in pages of architectural and social history of many houses in the neighbourhood. With each page the history of the district and its houses open amazing stories, and these houses become the threads in a continuing tapestry of this colourful and diverse community [see more about This Old House on page 2].


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Reclaim The Commons!

Imagine a public green space in the heart of your neighbourhood designed and cooperatively developed to provide free, fresh organic food, conserve and recycle resources, create native bird and insect habitat, and generally improve the local quality of life. If you live in the Fernwood area, you may be aware that the development of such a project has been underway for the last several years at the corner of Chambers Street and Gladstone Avenue. Indeed you may be one of many volunteers who have helped to transform this once barren gravel lot into the young forest of useful perennial plants we now see emerging there. It seems that almost every time I ride by the commons these days, all kinds of folks can be seen harvesting from and enjoying some part of this uniquely public community garden.

The site, which is currently owned by School District 61 and leased by the Fernwood Community Association, has a vaned and fascinating history. Its various incarnations over the last century have included: a public spring for drinking water, an old time wooden schoolhouse, a parking lot for school buses (yes the soil has been tested!), a derelict lot, and, more recently, an open pedestrian thoroughfare bounded by car-excluding boulders. At one point a coalition of groups attempted to establish drought tolerant plants in some areas of this unforgivingly and site (by then known as Spring Ridge Commons). But during the summer of 1999, when I began to get involved, most of the plants which had survived were struggling to do so.

What I saw in the site at that time was an opportunity to build on the past efforts of others and continue to develop the neighbourhood commons. but with permaculture design as the main focus. For those unfamiliar with the field, permaculture is a way of designing homes and communities to take into account basic human needs like food, clean water and clean energy. It can be applied on any scale, and uses what we know about the way natural systems work to create "agriculturally productive ecosystems" right where people live (to learn more, do an internet search).

Permaculture at Spring Ridge Commons would mean designing and establishing a diverse, multi-layered growing at Spring Ridge Commons garden of trees, shrubs, herbaceous perennials, and groundcovers which would be able to provide food, medicine, and other useful materials for

local folks. It would provide these things throughout the year instead of all at once, and would be able to attract enough beneficial insects to balance out any pest problems that might arise. Unlike a vegetable plot, it would produce more and more as time went by, while requiring less and less from the people who managed it. And unlike a fenced allotment garden, it would be there for everyone.

(Important Digression: As invaluable as allotments are to urban agriculture these days, it is worth considering their origin in England as a compensation scheme sold to peasants during the enclosure of their common lands by the ruling classes. To protest this fraudulent exchange, many took what we would now call "direct action." As the well known folk song goes, "In 1649, St Georges Hill, a ragged band they call the diggers came to show the people's will. They defied the landlords. They defied the laws. They were the dispossessed reclaiming what was theirs.")

In order to make possible the kind of garden we envisioned at the Commons, we realized the need for another permaculture strategy: sheet mulching. By utilizing abundant sources of urban waste, we kick-started the soil's fertilitygenerating ecosystem and dramatically increased its capacity to retain moisture while choking out weeds - all without digging! During a long series of volunteer work parties, literally tonnes of organic waste was diverted from the landfill and carefully applied in layers on top of the existing gravel. Cardboard, newspaper, landscaping waste, manure from the carriage tour folks, okara from the tofu factory, and kitchen scraps from local restaurants formed a magical rotting lasagne to begin healing the parched urban soil.

In addition to the initial soil-building and planting, Spring Ridge Commons has

benefitted over the past few years from the labour of countless volunteers who have weeded, watered, and built features including: rock walls, a herb spiral, a trellis, an arbour, and even a cob oven. Throughout this time, I've been coordinating these activities (with occasional assistance) on a volunteer basis, and have thoroughly enjoyed it. But the uncomfortable conclusion I've come to is that although the will exists in the community to work on the Commons, nothing productive tends to happen there without my involvement.

Clearly what this project needs, especially as I find myself no longer able to be as involved, is for more Fernwoodians to take responsibility for the Commons and form a coordination group (the FCA Friends of Spring Ridge Commons perhaps?). Currently I'm installing micro-spray irrigation, and there are several other exciting projects waiting to be taken on. The central idea of the project is that people can work together to cultivate common abundance in their public urban places. Free food and medicine grown close to home boosts food security, needs no lossil fuel, deepens our relationship to place, and really requires no more time and energy than do the relatively useless plants in your average city park.

The model of urban agriculture that Spring Ridge Commons provides poses a greater challenge to our individualistic culture than the allotment plot or backyard garden. But what if, in accepting this challenge to reclaim the Commons, we nourish not only our bodies, but our culture as well?

The mural that popped up in June at the corner of Gladstone and Fernwood is a group painting by local Fernwood artists. It was made possible with considerable help from Roberta Martell of the FCC, Carolyn Masson of the FCA, Mary Desprez of the Belfry Theatre, and the cooperation of building owner Robin Kimpton.

Harley Smart, an artist who sells his paintings in the Bastion Square Market, presented the design at a community meeting, and with the go-ahead. rounded up several young artists to help him with the project. The building has been subject to graffiti for ages, and an eyesore for the community. All of the artists involved were motivated to help beautify Fernwood Village, and agree that the mural will help deter future graffiti 'tags.'

On a Monday morning the white primer was rolled on, and for the following six days the artists toiled away. Harley was joined by Jai Balaam, Lucho Barahona, Andrew Dick, Arock, Eric Volet, Miles, JOE, Jules 1 and Indo, who contributed by adding a character on the wall or by sticking it out for the duration, doing colour fills and making sure the design was complete. Many people briefly stopped by and enjoyed painting a character to help "fill the neighbourhood." People waiting for the bus across the street and other passers-by were entertained by the sight of the artists at work. Drivers slowed down or stopped to get a better look.

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Greening Of Fernwood George Jay Elementary Marches Forward by Principal. Janine Roy

Trees. Green watered grass. An arbour boasting vines and flowers. A drinking fountain. Bike and walking paths. Soon you'll be able to ride your bike or stroll through the cooling green fragrance of Stevenson Park behind the FCC. You'll be able to toss frisbees on a watered playing field to the sounds of happy children playing in the new play area.

The plans for the coming year are:

 \S An arbour- which will be located next to the new play area and will provide an armature for flowering vines and feature a drinking fountain. It will be fabricated by Fernwood resident Al Dand.

 $\hat{\mathbb{Q}}$ An irrigation system - to keep the playing field green all summer.

More frees and shrubs - many of them flowering.

§ An improved bike path - a three meter width of compacted gravel to replace the current diagonal path cutting through the playing field.

A walkway - both the bike path and walkway will be fined with trees and shrubs and will extend the original Greenways Bike/Walking comdor which Fernwood proposed to the City several years ago.

§A long concrete bench - will extend along the field edge of the basketball. court as the first stage of an outdoor performance area and to provide seating for future community events.

Layout drawings and further information are posted in the windows at the FCC building on Gladstone Avenue and the FCA building on Fernwood Road. Please pass along your comments to committee members.

Other ideas under consideration include dowsing for the old spring, which was an original source of water for 19th century Victoria, and if rediscovered, using the water for the park. A wading pool, a stream, a hand pump, are among the possible uses for the water.

These improvements are being made to Stevenson Park through the ongoing efforts of the Fernwood Parks Steering Committee. Community members Jim. Starck, Dave Kesson, Todd Doherty, Bill Goers, Roberta Martell and Margaret Hantiuk have been meeting with City of Victoria staff Joe Daly, Deborah Bate, and Sue McKay for over a year to come up with the plan. This effort has been afforded by the ongoing cooperation of the Fernwood Community Association, the Fernwood Community Center, the Fernwood Healthy Communities Coalition, and the City of Victoria.

George Jay staff are getting geared up for an exciting year ahead! Our key goals for 2004-2005 are: improve student reading, writing and math skills. To accomplish this, staff and parents have worked together to develop the following plan:

1. We have a common time for teaching reading, writing and math so that teachers can work together to present lessons, develop activities and group students based on needs. 2. We have increased support time for students. We have three part-time teachers who will provide learning support in literacy. and math at the Kindergarten-Grade 1 level, the Grade 2-3 level and the Grade 4-5 level. We will also continue to have Reading Recovery, which is a special reading and writing support program for Grade 1 students.

George Jay staff are participating in a District Literacy Pilot Project where a literacy expert will work with teachers each day to focus on specific literacy skills with students. 4. We will continue to have our school-wide 'Home Reading Program'. Children are encouraged to read each night and we celebrate their reading success in newsletters, announcements and assemblies. 5. We will continue to assess individual students three times per year in reading, writing and math, and we will use these results to improve our programs so that we best meet student needs.

What Exciting Programs are at George Jay? We know how important it is for children to be ready to fearn each day. To help our students, we operate the Toast Club in the morning so children can get a light breakfast before their lessons begin. At lunchtime, children can be part of our provincially funded Hot Lunch Program. If children are in need of clothing, they can access clothes through our community-run Clothing Exchange at the school.

Our school will now be home to the district's First Nations Kindergarten program, which is a full-day Kindergarten program for First Nations children around the district. We look forward to welcoming this exciting program to our school. This program is in addition to our current First Nations Support Program, which provides cultural education and learning support to our

We have a Family Resource Room at George Jay. It is staffed by our Family Liaison, Lisa Clarabut, George Jay parents are welcome to come to the Family Resource Room to access information about programs and services available in the community, connect with other parents, talk to Lisa or check out the Clothing Exchange. George Jay parents and preschoolers are always welcome to drop in!

The federally funded HIPPY Program (Home Instruction Program for Preschool Youngsters) is based at George Jay. This program provides in-home support for families of three and four year-olds.
